1. Introductions

2. Current Outreach Strategy

Vancouver Police Department discuss their current outreach efforts

Opportunities for improvement and collaboration
Talking points:

Emphasize the importance of incorporating cultural and religious awareness into all levels of outreach, not just at the strategic level but also on the front lines. Question whether officers are adequately trained to recognize and respect the diversity within the Muslim community, including varied backgrounds and languages, and how this understanding influences their responses in the field.

Inquire about the strength and consistency of relationships between the police and Muslim community organizations, including mosques. Ask whether there are established protocols to ensure continuity in these relationships, even as officers or community leaders change roles. Highlight the importance of the Chief's direct involvement in fostering these relationships and ask about specific measures taken to maintain and enhance these connections over time.

Urge a discussion on whether there has been a dedicated effort to understand how community dynamics, especially within diverse communities, correlate with police use of force and other policing practices. Suggest exploring opportunities for improvement in this area through collaborative efforts with community organizations and leaders.

3. Community Concerns

Discussion on trust-building and preventing the erosion of trust within the Muslim community
Strategies for encouraging hate crime reporting and fostering trust between law enforcement and the Muslim community

Talking Points:

Inquire about the extent and depth of training provided to officers for recognizing hate crimes and incidents motivated by hate. Is such training mandatory for all officers? Emphasize the importance of comprehensive training that equips

officers to accurately identify and respond to hate crimes, ensuring they understand the nuances and complexities involved.

Address the necessity for law enforcement to be educated on Islamophobia, including its definitions, manifestations, and the increasing prevalence in Canada. Discuss how a deeper understanding of Islamophobia can inform more empathetic and effective policing strategies, and inquire about the steps being taken to integrate this knowledge into police training and practices.

Inquire about the established procedures when an incident is suspected to be motivated by hate. Is there a system in place for such incidents to be escalated for a secondary review or specialized investigation? Highlight the importance of a clear and transparent protocol that ensures hate-motivated incidents are taken seriously and handled with the appropriate level of scrutiny.

Discuss the concerning trend of underreported hate crimes within the Muslim community (provide evidence to support this if available). Ask what measures are being taken to address this issue and to encourage reporting. Explore whether there are barriers to reporting that the police could help to remove, and how law enforcement is working to build trust and ensure the Muslim community feels safe and supported in reporting hate crimes.

Suggest the potential for law enforcement to proactively engage with the Muslim community through outreach efforts, such as attending mosques or organizing community meetings (ex. setup a booth after Friday prayer or in Ramadan after Taraweeh). These initiatives could serve to educate community members on the importance of reporting hate crimes and understanding the role and procedures of the police. Inquire about the willingness to collaborate with community leaders to enhance awareness and trust, ensuring these efforts are seen as genuine and constructive.

Dialogue on protecting democratic freedoms during protests while ensuring public safety

Discussion on recent experiences, challenges, and successes in managing protests and minimizing conflict

Talking Points:

Inquire about the guidance and directives issued by the Chief of Police regarding the handling of protests. How does this top-down direction shape the overall approach of the police service to managing protests, ensuring that the balance between protecting democratic freedoms and public safety is maintained?

Discuss the nature and extent of training provided to frontline officers specific to policing protests. This should include aspects such as de-escalation techniques, crowd control, and the legal rights of protesters. Emphasize the importance of training that prepares officers to manage protests effectively while respecting the rights of individuals.

Address the measures in place to ensure that police actions and decisions during protests are impartial and not influenced by the background, cause of the protest, or political considerations. How does the Chief of Police ensure that the service's approach remains neutral and focused on public safety and order? (You can reference the example in Toronto where protests are being prevented)

Specifically concerning the conflict in Gaza, ask about the steps taken to engage with the Palestinian, pro-Palestinian, and broader Muslim communities. How has the police service worked to build relationships, establish communication channels, and present itself as a partner in facilitating peaceful protests rather than an obstacle?

Inquire whether there is a clear distinction in the training of officers between policing the rights of individuals versus protecting those rights, especially in the context of protests. This distinction is crucial in ensuring that officers understand and respect the fundamental democratic freedoms of assembly and speech.

Discuss the specific efforts made by the police service to protect freedom of expression, particularly in light of instances where this freedom may have been challenged, as observed in Calgary (from the river to the sea, Palestine will be free).

What proactive measures are being taken to ensure that the right to peaceful protest is upheld, and how are these efforts communicated to the public to build trust and understanding?

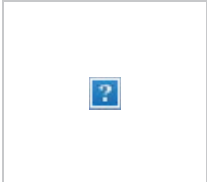

Dear Terry,

We hope this email finds you well!

Following our productive discussions, we'd like to solidify our next steps in addressing the urgent issue of hate crimes targeting Vancouver's Muslim community.

As we've outlined, far too many Islamophobic incidents go unreported. We believe a crucial step is empowering community members with clear, accessible information. Additionally, we propose the following collaborative actions with the VPD:

Informational Workshops: Conduct workshops within mosques and community

centers to educate members on hate crime identification, reporting procedures, and victim rights.

Poster Development: Our Asks for VPD Collaboration

We request the VPD's active partnership in designing the previously discussed informational posters. Our key asks for this collaboration include:

Addressing Specific Muslim Experiences:

- The poster should directly address the types of hate crimes frequently targeting Muslims. Examples include:
- Physical assaults motivated by Islamophobic bias (hijab pulling, attacks on individuals visibly identifiable as Muslim)
- Vandalism and desecration of mosques and Islamic centers
- Online hate speech, threats, and the spread of harmful stereotypes against Muslims

Tackling Underreporting Barriers:

- **Immigration Fears:** Prominently feature the statement: "Reporting a hate crime WILL NOT affect your immigration status. Your safety is our priority."
- **Potential Distrust:** Include a message acknowledging past challenges and emphasizing the VPD's current commitment to:
 - Treating all reports with sensitivity and respect
 - Thoroughly investigating every hate-motivated incident
 - Holding perpetrators accountable
- **Confusion about Reporting:** Clearly define "hate crimes" and "hate-motivated incidents", providing real-world examples to illustrate the distinctions.

Demonstrating VPD Support:

- Include the VPD logo prominently.
- Feature a quote or short statement from a Muslim officer within the VPD (if available and feasible), expressing solidarity and a commitment to combating hate.

Enhanced Representation: Work together to develop strategies for increasing the representation of Muslims within law enforcement, fostering greater trust and understanding.

Our specific goals are to:

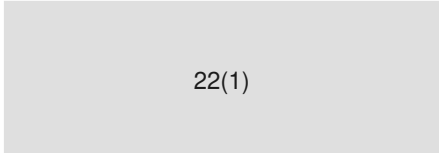
Increase Reporting: Equip individuals with the knowledge to confidently report hate-motivated offenses.

Reduce Fear: Reassure victims that their immigration status will never be jeopardized by hate crime reporting.

Enhance Safety: Create a stronger sense of security within the community. Could we schedule a follow-up call to solidify these action items and develop a timeline?
